The Sacrament of Covenant (Infant) Baptism

As we read through the Word of God, it becomes clear that God's sovereign grace is embraced in the "covenant" framework of Scripture. By grace alone, God has *covenanted* with His people that He will have them to/for Himself from every nation, tribe, people, and language (Rev 7). It is a covenant generally that embraces family solidarity (see Acts 2:39; Acts 16:31; Gen 17:7). As noted elsewhere, "every person identified in the Bible as having a household present at his or her conversion also had the household baptized."

Because of God's covenant, all history marches forward to the time when God's covenant people will live in the New Jerusalem in a renewed world order enjoying fully their relationship with God: "they will be His people, and God Himself will be their God" (see Rev. 21:3).

Even today, Christ continues as "the Mediator of the new covenant" (Heb 8), the one Mediator between God and man (1 Tim 2). Salvation is covenant salvation: regeneration, justification, adoption, sanctification are covenant mercies. Baptism and the Lord's Supper, corresponding to/replacing the old covenant rites of circumcision and Passover, are covenant ordinances. God's law is covenant law, and keeping it is the truest expression of gratitude for covenant grace and loyalty to our covenant God. An understanding of this covenant of grace guides us through, and helps us appreciate, all the wonders of God's redeeming love.

Christians in our theological tradition believe that children of believers, infant children, are and should be included as members of the visible covenant community, the church. Why? Because we believe, based upon the Bible, that infant children of believers have the status of covenant children and therefore should be baptized, just as Jewish male infants previously had been circumcised. Again, why? Because, if infants are deemed members of the visible covenant community with their believing parents, it is fitting to give them the sign of covenant status and of their place in the covenant community.

Is there something magic about the water? No. Do baptized infants have no obligation to make a public profession of personal faith in Jesus Christ? Certainly, they do. When we celebrate the sacrament of covenant baptism, we publicly recognize a covenant child through the covenant sign of baptism as a child of at least one believing parent (1 Cor 7:14), thus as a member of the visible church. At the same time, we are careful also to affirm that neither baptism nor being the child of believing parents will suffice to make that child a true believer. At some point, each baptized infant/child must personally turn from their sins and express their own faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

The outward and visible sign in baptism is water. As water is poured down on the head of a child, we are reminded of the cleansing blood of the Lord Jesus Christ that delivers us from the penalty of sin (1 John 1:7) as well as the sanctifying virtue of the Holy Spirit delivering us from the power of sin (Rom 8:2).

SERMON QUESTIONS

- Why is mercy so hard? What makes mercy difficult for us naturally? How does our culture make mercy seem weak? How does understanding our own bitterness help us approach mercy humbly?
- Both Joseph and his brothers avoided each other for 20 years. How did God use the famine to force them together? When has God arranged circumstances to bring you face-to-face with someone you were avoiding?
- Compare Joseph's harsh treatment (vv. 6-17) with his gracious response (vv. 19-25). Verse 18 shows the turning point! For Joseph, time was a tool that incubated mercy. How many days elapsed? Why is time essential in giving mercy? Share about rushing to respond vs. taking time to wrestle with God.
- Time alone was not enough. During that time, the fear of God also incubated mercy. What is the fear of God? How does reverence for God (v. 18) move us toward mercy rather than revenge? When you consider God's mercy toward your own sins, how does that change your perspective on forgiving others?
- Joseph gave them grain that wasn't his—someone else paid the price. How does the cross show mercy's ultimate cost? What sins has Jesus forgiven you? How might going to Jesus' storehouse of mercy help us freely give what others don't deserve?
- Our assignment is to think of someone specific—either someone who hurt you or someone you've hurt. What's one concrete step towards mercy this week? How might going to the cross yourself (remembering your own need for Jesus' mercy) change your next interaction with them?

Big Idea:

This chapter teaches us that mercy doesn't come naturally when we're wounded. There's a process we must undergo to extend to others what we ourselves have freely received in Christ. And when this process runs its full course, we are enabled to feel and act differently towards those who have hurt us. And, the recipients of mercy are equally transformed by it. What we see in this chapter isn't yet full reconciliation (it comes a little later)—but it's well on its way.

Sermon Points:

1. Troubles that incites mercy
2. Time and fear that incubates costly mercy
3. Transformation in the hearts of the recipients of mercy



- Each elder will now be joined by a Care Team of deacons, men, and women in our congregation.
- One member of the Care Team (your Care Advocate) will be assigned to you to pray for and check-in with you regularly.

Habits of the Household

Based on Justin Whitmel Earley's *Habits of the Household*, this class explores how everyday family routines can be transformed into intentional practices of spiritual formation.

Over seven weeks, we examine key habits—waking, mealtimes, discipline, screen time, family devotions, work, and bedtime—considering how each can shape both parents and children in the way of Christ. Participants will reflect on their own household rhythms, engage in group discussion, and be challenged to implement small but meaningful changes rooted in grace.

Each session pairs practical ideas with biblical wisdom, aiming to cultivate habits that form hearts, not just behaviors. This class is ideal for parents, caregivers, and anyone seeking to integrate faith into the ordinary moments of family life.

In Pursuit of Biblical Creativity

Romans 12 compels us to “offer our bodies as living sacrifices” in the pursuit of God’s good purpose, rather than being “conformed to the pattern of this world.” Genesis 1 calls us to participate as stewards by imitating God’s creative demonstration, “putting things into good order.”

In this class, we will seek to inhabit a framework for navigating this pursuit of “good order.” We will consider our roles as explorers, makers, and participants in God’s eternal purpose as he forms (and re-forms) our affections to resonate with his desires. Through our “creative activity,” we can “taste and see that the Lord is good” by imaginatively pursuing beauty, goodness, and truth in every area of our lives, doing all that we do “as unto the Lord.”
